Who Will Be on My Ballot? Why Vote in These Elections?

- You are choosing these candidates who will make decisions that affect your daily life.
- Allegheny County: County Executive, Controller, Treasurer, District Attorney, and County Council; Municipal/Borough/Town Councils and School Boards; and Court of Common Pleas and Magisterial District Judges
- Pittsburgh: City Council, City Treasurer, and School Board Members
- Statewide Judges: Supreme, Superior, and Commonwealth Courts



Where is Candidate Information?

For information about candidates on your ballot, go to <u>Vote411.org</u>. Enter your home address. Check back for updates.

Who Is Eligible to Vote?

- US citizens 18 years old or older as of May 16, 2023,
- PA residents for 30 days prior to May 16, 2023, and
- Registered Democrat or Republican.
 - PA has CLOSED Primaries to select candidates. Members of other parties and independents cannot vote for primary candidates but can vote for special elections and ballot questions.
 - All voters can select any candidate of any party in the November General Election.

What Are the Deadlines? Postmarks do not count! MAIL EARLY!

- May 1: Last day to register to vote and must be received by 5 pm.
- May 9: Last day to apply for a mail-in or absentee ballot. Your completed
 application must be received in the Allegheny County Elections Division* by 5 pm.
- May 16: Election Day. Vote in person at your precinct. Or have your Mail-in or Absentee Ballot received in the Allegheny County Elections Division* by 8 pm.

How Do I Register?

- Online: Go to <u>vote.pa.gov</u> to register, check your voter registration, or change your address, name, or party affiliation. It is easiest to register using a PA Driver's License or PennDOT ID. You may also apply by using the last 4 digits of your Social Security Number and uploading a signature.
- On paper: Download the paper registration form from vote.pa.gov or request the form from Allegheny County Elections Division* or the League of Women Voters**.

How Do I Cast My Ballot?

To Vote in Person:

 Polls are open from 7 am – 8 pm on Election Day, MAY 16. Use "Additional Voter Resources" at the bottom of this page to find your polling place. If you are a first-time voter, or voting at a new precinct for the first time, bring your voter registration card or another valid ID. Don't leave without voting. Anyone may request a provisional ballot.

To Vote by Mail:

Any registered voter can apply for a Mail-In Ballot or Absentee Ballot. **There Are Two Steps:**



- a) To obtain and submit a **PAPER application**:
- Go to <u>Vote.PA.gov</u> to download the application form. Or, request one be mailed to you by calling the Allegheny County Elections Division* (412-350-4500) or the <u>League of Women Voters</u>** (412-261-4284). Complete, sign, and mail your paper application to the Allegheny County Elections Division*.
- b) To submit an ONLINE application:
 - Go to <u>Vote.PA.gov.</u> It is easiest to apply using a PA Driver's License or PennDOT ID.
 You may also apply by using the last 4 digits of your Social Security Number and
 uploading a signature.

(2) Complete and Mail Your Mail-in or Absentee ballot

- After your application is approved and your county's candidate list is official, your Mailin or Absentee Ballot will be mailed to you.
- Complete your ballot. Insert your ballot in the secrecy envelope. Seal it.
- Insert secrecy envelope into official return envelope. Seal it. Sign it. Date it. Mail it.
- Ballots in unsigned or undated envelopes will not be counted.

Voters with Criminal Records

In Pennsylvania, voters with criminal records who are not currently incarcerated on a felony charge are eligible to vote. Voters who are incarcerated but who are pre-trial may also vote and may request an absentee ballot. Voters who are incarcerated for misdemeanors may vote. Voters who are on probation or released on parole are eligible to vote. For more detailed information, see this <u>Department of State webpage</u>.
