## The CLOSED PRIMARY in Pennsylvania





Now that I REGISTERED TO VOTE, tell me WHEN I need to vote!

There are TWO ELECTIONS EVERY YEAR; A CLOSED PRIMARY in the spring, and a GENERAL ELECTION in the fall.





What is a CLOSED Primary in Pennsylvania??

THE CLOSED PRIMARY is when members of ONLY the TWO MAJOR political parties--REPUBLICAN OR DEMOCRATIC--choose their CANDIDATES for the GENERAL ELECTION.





When I registered to vote, I saw the Democratic, Republican, Green, and Liberterian parties on my application. Where was the INDEPENDENT party?

There is no "INDEPENDENT" party in Pennsylvania, but candidates in the Libertarian, Green, and Keystone parties may have candidates on the GENERAL Election balllot. (ANY registered voter CAN VOTE for ANY candidate of ANY party in the GENERAL ELECTION.)





I also remember that when I registered to vote, I could have CHOSEN to JOIN the Republican or Democratic Party. YES. When you REGISTERED TO VOTE,\* in order to vote in a Closed Primary, you had to CHOOSE either the DEMOCRATIC or REPUBLICAN PARTY. PA Primaries are CLOSED to voters who haven't joined one of the major parties or who have chosen a "third" party.





So, if I don't join one of the two major parties, I CAN'T VOTE in the PA CLOSED PRIMARY??
That's right, except...

or Republican MAY VOTE in a PA Primary
ONLY IF there is a ballot question, constitutional
amendment or special election.

Those voters who are NOT registered as Democratic



\*IMPORTANT!! At any time, you can add or change your "party affiliation" by going to <u>vote.pa.gov</u>. If you choose to join either the Democratic or Republican party, then on PRIMARY ELECTION DAY when you go to your polling place, you will receive a ballot that has candidates ONLY from the party you chose--Republican or Democratic. Non-affiliated voters may vote in a Primary (and will receive a different ballot from Democrats and Republicans) only if there is a ballot question, constitutional amendment or special election.
